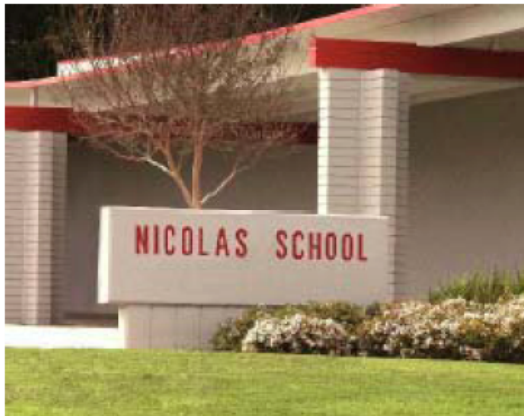

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A Message from the Principal

School Description

Nicolas Junior High School is located in the southern section of Fullerton, one of 19 school sites in the Fullerton School District. The 2002-03 school year enrollment at Nicolas, as officially reported to CBEDS (California Basic Educational Data Systems) was 1,238. The ethnic breakdown of the student body is 29.8% White, 59.5% Hispanic, 5.4% Asian, 1.1% Filipino, 3.5% African America, .5% Pacific Islander and .2% American Indian.

In addition to ethnic diversity, the student body at Nicolas Junior High School has 400 students whose English proficiency is limited. These students speak ten different languages, with Spanish representing the largest language group.

Opportunities for Parent Involvement

Parents who wish to participate in School Site Council, PTA, English Learners Advisory Council, school activities, or become a volunteer may contact the school office.



Safety, Cleanliness and Adequacy of School Facilities

Safety of students and staff is a primary concern of the Fullerton School District. In compliance with SB187, each school maintains a Safe Schools Plan, which satisfies the mandates of the law and reflects the individual needs of the site. The major focus areas of the plan are: 1) providing a safe learning environment; 2) safe practices at school sponsored activities and in route to and from school; 3) connecting families with community resources; 4) building an environment of mutual respect. The Comprehensive School Safety Plan was last updated in April 2003, approved by the School Site Council and reviewed with the staff in May 2003.

At Nicolas Junior High School, we believe in the importance of working together with our community. Opportunities for student leadership and involvement are available through Student Council, and School Site Council.

Climate for Learning

Nicolas Junior High School's educational environment has a strong academic focus. Students are rewarded for their efforts through:

Our school-wide discipline plan ensures an orderly school environment. School and classroom expectations are clearly communicated to parents and students, with consequences consistently enforced. Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR)

Through the California Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program, students in grades 2-11 are tested annually in various subject areas. Currently, the STAR program includes California Standards Tests (CST) in English-language arts and mathematics in grades 2-11, science and history/social science in grades 9-11, and a norm-referenced test, which tests reading, language, and mathematics in grades 2-11, spelling in grades 2-8, and science in grades 9-11.

California Standards Tests (CST)

The California Standards Tests (CST) show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. Student scores are reported as performance levels. The five performance levels are Advanced (exceeds state standards), Proficient (meets state standards), Basic (approaching state standards), Below Basic (below state standards), and Far Below Basic (well below state standards). Students scoring at the Proficient or Advanced level meet state standards in that content area. Norm-Referenced Test (NRT)

Reading and mathematics results from the Norm-Referenced Test (NRT), adopted by the State Board of Education (this was the Stanford 9 test up until 2003, but was changed to the California Achievement Test, Sixth Edition for 2003), are reported for each grade level as the percent of tested students scoring at or above the 50th percentile (the national average). School results are compared to results at the district and state levels. Academic Performance Index (API)

The **Academic Performance Index (API)** is a score on a scale of 200 to 1000 that annually measures the academic performance and progress of individual schools in California. On an interim basis, the state has set 800 as the API score that schools should strive to meet.

Growth Targets: The annual growth target for a school is 5 percent of the distance between its Base API and 800. The growth target for a school at or above 800 is to remain at or above 800. Actual growth is the number of API points a school gained between its base and growth years. Schools that reach their annual targets are eligible for awards. Schools that do not meet their targets and have a statewide API rank of one to five are eligible to participate in the Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP), which provides resources to schools to improve their academic achievement. There was no money allocated to the II/USP Program in 2002 or 2003.

Subgroup APIs and Targets: In addition to a schoolwide API, schools also receive API scores for each numerically significant subgroup in the school (i.e., racial/ethnic subgroups and socioeconomically disadvantaged students). Growth targets, equal to 80 percent of the school's target, are also set for each of the subgroups. Each subgroup must also meet its target for the school to be eligible for awards.

Percent Tested: In order to be eligible for awards, elementary and middle schools must test at least 95 percent of their students in grades 2-8 and high schools must test at least 90 percent of their students in grades 9-11 on STAR.

Statewide Rank: Schools receiving a Base API score are ranked in ten categories of equal size (deciles) from one (lowest) to ten (highest), according to type of school (elementary, middle, or high school).

Similar Schools Rank: Schools also receive a ranking that compares that school to 100 other schools with similar demographic characteristics. Each set of 100 schools is ranked by API score from one (lowest) to ten (highest) to indicate how well the school performed compared to schools most like it.

API criteria are subject to change as new legislation is enacted into law. 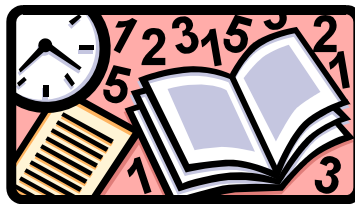

Substitute Teachers

The school district maintains a list of qualified substitute teachers. Three hundred and sixty-five substitutes were on the 2002-03 district substitute list. During the 2002-03 school year Nicolas was able to obtain substitute teachers on all days needed.

School Instruction and Leadership

Allan Waterman, the school principal, has been the principal of Nicolas Junior High School since 1998. Allan Waterman holds a California Administrative Credential and a Masters degree in Education. Prior to being principal of Nicolas Junior High, he was a teacher for 14 years, an activities director for 8 years, and an assistant principal for 5 years.

The Nicolas Junior High School Leadership Team is composed of 2 assistant principals, the school counselor and the chairs of all departments on campus. The Leadership Team meets monthly and has responsibility for staff based decisions and input on administrative decisions.

Professional Development

The State Department of Education requires all teachers to have a completed Bachelors degree plus 20 additional units of credit to be certificated to teach in California public schools. Teaching assignments are made by the school principal. All of Nicolas Junior High's teachers are appropriately credentialed.

Highly Qualified Teachers

The No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) requires local educational agencies (LEAs) to report specific data regarding highly qualified teachers. As of December of 2003, the State Board of Education (SBE) had not approved a definition for use in reporting data pertaining to highly qualified teachers. Therefore, the requirement that LEAs include these data will not apply to reports published during the 2003-04 school year.

Teacher Credentials

Data reported are the number of teachers (full-time and part-time). Each teacher is counted as '1'. If a teacher works at two schools, he/she is only counted at one school. Data are not available for teachers with a full credential and teaching outside his/her subject area.

Teacher Evaluations

Administrators evaluate teachers based on State Education Code requirements, provisions of the certificated contract agreement, and district policy. This year district and site level curriculum work focused on:

- Adoption of Grade 6 standards-based Language Arts textbook material
- Adoption and implementation of standards-based Science curricula and materials
- Continuing the implementation of grades K-6 standards-based report cards
- Collection of multiple student assessment data by class/grade
- Evaluating and adopting standards-based Math textbook materials K-8
- Continuing the implementation of the California Reading Initiative (Teacher Training Component) for teachers new to Fullerton School District

Counselors and Other Support Staff

Data reported are in units of full-time equivalents (FTE). One FTE is defined as a staff person who is working 100 percent (i.e., full time). Two staff persons who each work 50 percent of full time also equals one FTE.

Instructional Minutes

The California Education Code establishes the required number of instructional minutes per year for each grade. Data reported compares the number of instructional minutes offered at the school level to the state requirement for each grade. Although Fullerton junior high schools have 10 minimum days during the school year, students attend the full 180 days of designated instruction. Actual instructional minutes exceed state requirements.
