A Message from the Principal

In the spring of 2002, Sunset Lane Elementary School was named a California Distinguished School. This prestigious award was given to only 247 elementary schools in the state. Schools were selected based on the following criteria: 1) Common School Vision; 2) Implementation of State Standards; 3) Strong student assessment program; 4) Rigorous and challenging curriculum; 5) Professional and dedicated staff; 6) Technology to support the curriculum; 7) Positive school culture; 8) Support for at-risk students; 9) Safe and healthy school; 10) Family and community participation. We are very appreciative of this recognition by the California Department of Education. We have long been aware that the strength of our school community, dedicated staff, and challenging programs have made Sunset Lane an exemplary school.



School Description

Sunset Lane Elementary School is located in the northeastern section of Fullerton, one of 19 school sites in the Fullerton School District. The 2002-03 school year enrollment at Sunset, as officially reported to CBEDS (California Basic Educational Data Systems) was 824. The ethnic breakdown of the student body is 25.8% White, 7.5% Hispanic, 64.2% Asian, .8% Filipino, .1% Pacific Islander, .1% American Indian or Alaska Native, and 1.3% African-American.

In addition to ethnic diversity, the student body at Sunset Lane Elementary School has 246 students whose English proficiency is limited. These students speak twelve different languages with Korean representing the largest language group.

Safety, Cleanliness and Adequacy of School Facilities

Safety of students and staff is a primary concern of the Fullerton School District. In compliance with SB187, each school maintains a Safe Schools Plan, which satisfies the mandates of the law and reflects the individual needs of the site. The major focus areas of the plan are: 1) providing a safe learning environment; 2) safe practices at school sponsored activities and in route to and from school; 3) connecting families with community resources; 4) building an environment of mutual respect. The Comprehensive School Safety Plan was last updated and approved by the School Site Council on March 2003 and reviewed by staff on May 2003.

At Sunset Lane School, parents and the community are encouraged to visit and to help the classroom teachers. There is a sign-in book and name badges in the office for our visitors.

Climate for Learning

Sunset Lane Elementary School's educational environment has a strong academic focus. Students are rewarded for their efforts through:

- Special Activities

Students can participate in:

Our school-wide discipline plan ensures an orderly school environment. School and classroom expectations are clearly communicated to parents and students, with consequences consistently enforced. Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR)

Through the California Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program, students in grades 2-11 are tested annually in various subject areas. Currently, the STAR program includes California Standards Tests (CST) in English-language arts and mathematics in grades 2-11, science and history/social science in grades 9-11, and a norm-referenced test, which tests reading, language, and mathematics in grades 2-11, spelling in grades 2-8, and science in grades 9-11.

California Standards Tests (CST)

The California Standards Tests (CST) show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. Student scores are reported as performance levels. The five performance levels are Advanced (exceeds state standards), Proficient (meets state standards), Basic (approaching state standards), Below Basic (below state standards), and Far Below Basic (well below state standards). Students scoring at the Proficient or Advanced level meet state standards in that content area. Norm-Referenced Test (NRT)

Academic Performance Index (API)

The Academic Performance Index (API) is a score on a scale of 200 to 1000 that annually measures the academic performance and progress of individual schools in California. On an interim basis, the state has set 800 as the API score that schools should strive to meet.

Growth Targets: The annual growth target for a school is 5 percent of the distance between its Base API and 800. The growth target for a school at or above 800 is to remain at or above 800. Actual growth is the number of API points a school gained between its base and growth years. Schools that reach their annual targets are eligible for awards. Schools that do not meet their targets and have a statewide API rank of one to five are eligible to participate in the Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP), which provides resources to schools to improve their academic achievement. There was no money allocated to the II/USP Program in 2002 or 2003.

Subgroup APIs and Targets: In addition to a schoolwide API, schools also receive API scores for each numerically significant subgroup in the school (i.e., racial/ethnic subgroups and socioeconomically disadvantaged students). Growth targets, equal to 80 percent of the school's target, are also set for each of the subgroups. Each subgroup must also meet its target for the school to be eligible for awards.

Percent Tested: In order to be eligible for awards, elementary and middle schools must test at least 95 percent of their students in grades 2-8 and high schools must test at least 90 percent of their students in grades 9-11 on STAR.

Statewide Rank: Schools receiving a Base API score are ranked in ten categories of equal size (deciles) from one (lowest) to ten (highest), according to type of school (elementary, middle, or high school).

Similar Schools Rank: Schools also receive a ranking that compares that school to 100 other schools with similar demographic characteristics. Each set of 100 schools is ranked by API score from one (lowest) to ten (highest) to indicate how well the school performed compared to schools most like it.

API criteria are subject to change as new legislation is enacted into law. 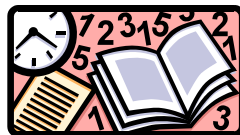

Substitute Teachers

The school district maintains a list of qualified substitute teachers. Three hundred and sixty-five substitutes were on the 2002-03 district substitute list. During the 2002-03 school year Sunset Lane School was able to obtain substitute teachers on all days needed.

School Instruction and Leadership

Dr. Kit Dameron, the school principal, has been the principal of Sunset Lane since 1999. Dr. Dameron holds a California Administrative Credential and an Ed.D. in Educational Management. Prior to being the principal of Sunset Lane, she was a teacher for seven years, a Program Specialist, and a principal in other districts.

The Sunset Lane Leadership Team is composed of nine members, one representative from each grade level, a representative from Special Education, and a representative from our English Language Learners program. The Leadership Team has responsibility for making most school site decisions. It usually meets every Friday.

Highly Qualified Teachers

The No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) requires local educational agencies (LEAs) to report specific data regarding highly qualified teachers. As of December of 2003, the State Board of Education (SBE) had not approved a definition for use in reporting data pertaining to highly qualified teachers. Therefore, the requirement that LEAs include these data will not apply to reports published during the 2003-04 school year.



Professional Development

The State Department of Education requires all teachers to have a completed Bachelors degree plus 20 additional units of credit to be certificated to teach in California public schools. Teaching assignments are made by the school principal. All of Sunset Lane Elementary School’s teachers are appropriately credentialed.

Teacher Evaluations

Administrators evaluate teachers based on State Education Code requirements, provisions of the certificated contract agreement, and district policy. This year district and site level curriculum work focused on:

- Standards/Assessment/Accountability via the School Plan
- Adoption of Grade 6 standards-based Language Arts textbook material
- Adoption and implementation of standards-based Science curricula and materials
- Continuing the implementation of grades K-6 standards-based report cards
- Collection of multiple student assessment data by class/grade
- Evaluating and adopting standards-based Math textbook materials K-8
- Continuing the implementation of the California Reading Initiative (Teacher Training Component) for teachers new to Fullerton School District

Instructional Minutes

The California *Education Code* establishes the required number of instructional minutes per year for each grade. Data reported compares the number of instructional minutes offered at the school level to the state requirement for each grade. Although Fullerton elementary schools have restructured Wednesdays for staff development, students attend the full 180 days of designated instruction. Actual instructional minutes exceed state requirements.
